OVERVIEW

RESULTS

Jury returns defense verdict for ER physician, hospital physician group and hospital.

Health Care Liability

March 16, 2023

The plaintiff filed a medical malpractice case, claiming the emergency room physician failed to appropriately treat her elevated blood sugar and groin abscess, leading to necrotizing fasciitis. The evidence presented to the jury supported the argument that the emergency room physician appropriately treated the small spontaneously draining groin abscess as presented, there were no signs of systemic infection, and the physician gave appropriate instructions for the plaintiff to return to the hospital if her symptoms changed or worsened.

SIGNIFICANT REPRESENTATIVE MATTERS

Obtained a defense verdict on behalf of a hospital client following a trial involving the death of an elderly patient who criticized emergency medicine care and internal medicine care regarding anticoagulation medications and inappropriate discharge. (2020)

Obtained a defense verdict in a trial involving allegations that a hospital client failed to reconcile a home Benzodiazepine medication which led to a grand mal seizure, multiple spinal compression fractures, chronic pain and lifelong care needs. (2016)

Obtained a defense verdict in a trial involving the death of an elderly patient following the administration of a narcotic medication by an emergency physician. (2006)

Obtained a defense verdict in a trial involving a urologist and failure to diagnose testicular cancer resulting in the death of a 49-year-old man. (2000)
